From the Superintendent's desk:

The winter weather season had been pretty mild until last week when the snow storm forced us to cancel two days of school. These two days of no school along with our two professional development days when we don't have school, one in the fall and one in the spring will be monitored to make sure we schedule enough instructional hours because the weather in February and March can be very unpredictable. When we approved the 2017-2018 school calendar last spring, we decided to set the last day of school at the March school board meeting so parents and staff could plan their summer. Hopefully our weather will cooperate and we will not have to make up any academic time at the end of the school year.

An update for parents of future 3 and 4-year old preschool students, we will begin posting the preschool applications in the near future in the Humphrey Democrat and on our school website to help ensure all parents of preschool children living in the district receive this information. We will be able to take a maximum of 20 students in each age level, if we have over 20 students, we will need to follow the preschool acceptance criteria located on the school website. If you ever have any questions, feel free to call the school and we will be happy to answer them.

A couple of reminders heading into February; Humphrey Public will again be hosting our own Speech meet on Saturday, February 10, I encourage you to come out and support the Speech students and coaches. This year's sub-district basketball tournaments for both boys and girls will be played at St. Paul High School. If you remember, this is where we played our volleyball sub-districts, because of the distance we had to travel in comparison to the other schools in our sub, I called the NSAA to see if there was any way this could be moved to Albion which is more centrally located but the contract had already been approved by the NSAA to go to St. Paul. I want to wish the players and coaches good luck at both conference and district tournaments. The 2nd semester Parent-Teacher conferences will be held on Monday, February 5, 2018 from 2:00 – 8:30 p.m., we will have a 1:00 dismissal for students that day. I encourage as many parents as possible to attend the conferences to make sure the school; parent and student are on the same page regarding communication. Statistics show, high parental involvement in school will lead to improved academic performance by your child. Thank you and we hope to see you on the 5th. The comp day for teachers will be Friday, February 9, 2018 meaning there is no school for students and staff. In addition, there will be no school for students on Wednesday, February 7 as this is one of our two Marzano Frameworks professional development work days for staff.

As always, I want to continue to emphasize to our patrons in the district, should you ever have any questions, please call and get the answers. This will help curb misinformation and eliminate rumors and your concerns. Clear and open communication between the community and the school are vital areas in the success of our school. 

- 1. The ACT is getting near. Each of you have a FREE personalized ACT Prep through the actual www.act.org web page. I have emailed you all your usernames and passwords. If you have questions or problems with this, please come and see me. I hope that you all take full advantage of this prep along with John Baylor for the ACT.
- 2. As with the younger classmen, make sure you are diligently trying on your coursework and staying involved when possible. It truly helps create well-rounded young adults.
- 3. I also encourage you all to continue to visit colleges. The best way to know if a fit is right for you is to see it first-hand. Before visiting the college, make sure that it would have the degree for the career you are hoping to have. While on campus, make sure you are attending with questions and take advantage of what the tour guides have to share with you. If you need help getting set up with one, please let me know.
- 4. Scheduling a job shadow is also a great activity to do while you are still in high school. I have almost all of you in Careers and it is a requirement, so the sooner you can get it done, the less stress you'll have. If there is anything else I can help you with, I am happy to help.

Seniors:

- 1. It is very important for you all to have the FAFSA completed by now. If you are having problems, please come in and see me so we can get it taken care of. Continue getting scholarships completed.
- 2. As an FYI, you all have until May 1st to accept scholarships given directly from an university. This is set forth by the National Association for College Admission Counseling, which means that colleges will not be lenient. May 1st is the absolute last day to accept them.
- 3. These scholarships are different than the scholarships that I will share with you. As I receive notice of scholarships, I will send them to each of you. Each scholarship will have its own deadline. Pay close attention to those dates so that you do not miss submitting them. Remember that ScholarshipQuest, EducationQuest, and College Board are all good resources for you as you continue searching for and filling out scholarships. If you have issues with scholarships or need someone to look over final drafts, please let me know. I am here to help in whatever way possible.

Greetings from the shop!

We often talk about how fast the year is going, which is OK. As we stay active and go to the school events time moves along just fine. January is a month the faster the better. Now what's happening in school? In the shop classes we added some extra challenging tools to make learning fun and project outcomes better.



- 1. CNC Router- This machine routers lettering, designs, and shapes into the wood. We use this machine for names in drawer fronts, clocks, or fancy designs added onto their projects.
- 2. Laser engraver- This machine lasers designs in to wood, like pictures, lettering or special designs going into student projects.
- 3. 3-D Printer- This tool produces projects out of plastics. We can construct gears, whistles, cups, and so on. Students use this machine to create new and different types of projects.

All three of these machines along with the traditional tools we have to help students create and construct fun and rewarding projects. The fun thing about shop classes is the creating of new and challenging projects. The students have several choices when taking classes. They can take Woods, Small Engines, Drafting, Building Construction, House Wiring. These are some of the choices that students can take. The challenging thing is what will the skill students need in the years to come? We try to create the interest that students can benefit from when looking for a rewarding career. Shops are always open for visitors. Later!

Title I Reading & Math

Happy Valentine's Day from the Title Room!

The title reading and math classes have been working on a variety of things so far this year. In reading, the Kindergarten through 2nd graders have been working on Sound Partners. We talk about and practice what sounds the letters make and read words with those sounds in them. We also practice writing the words. In the 3rd – 6th grades, we have been working on different reading skills like main idea, summaries, fact/non-fact, sequencing, figurative language, and cause and effect. One day a week, we all focus on working on improving our fluency and retell scores when we read orally. We call it "Fluency Fridays". We read for one minute then we retell for one minute. We then record how many words we read in the minute and how many errors we had. We record them on a graph that we can look back on each week to see our progress.

Math title students, depending on their grade level, have been working on adding, subtracting, multiplying, and dividing. We use whole numbers, fractions, decimal numbers, and integers. We also spend some time on geometry!

Whatever the day, you can be sure that we are putting our "whole heart" into everything we do!

On Thursday, February 8th, the Center for Survivor's Revolution Group is presenting to our students. The primary purpose of this presentation is dating violence and sexual assault prevention with an emphasis on how to help your friends who may be in one of these situations. As part of the Lindsay Ann Burke Act, all public schools in the state of Nebraska are required to instruct on domestic violence and abuse. This presentation provides the necessary instruction. The presentation includes a dramatization containing some strong language. This is done so that students feel as if they are truly witnessing violence, and making the presentation more personal and real. There will also be an opportunity for students to ask questions regarding the violence and how to react in those situations. Revolution has been providing these presentations for over ten years. This will be presented to our 7th through 12th grade students. Parents are welcome to attend the event.

The Center for Survivors is a free service to students and families in our district. They provide services specialized in domestic abuse, but are also available for conversations and counseling. They even help families get on their feet when the needs arise. We are lucky to receive their services, and are excited for them to spend some time with us on the 8th. The presentation will begin at 8:50 AM and will last until approximately 10:05.


Greetings from the English Room! Well, 2018 is off and running, and we are busy as ever in the classroom!

The juniors are in the midst of reading *Catching Fire*. They are working in small groups on discussing themes of the book and on making an A-B-C book about the games. At the end of the book, the juniors will engage in a Socratic Seminar in which they will discuss the themes, symbols, and main ideas of the book.

The seniors started the semester with *Hamlet*. They will be working independently on several things this semester in order to prepare themselves for their college and work lives outside of school. They will make a memory book to display at their graduation parties, and they will read *Mockingjay* in small groups of their choosing. In addition to finding themes, symbols, and answers to literal and inferential questions, the seniors will cooperatively create small and large projects that are representative the book.

Freshmen and sophomores have been busy with grammar and diagramming sentences. This semester, the freshmen will write and perform speeches, read *Romeo and Juliet*, and read *The Outsiders*. The sophomores will spend the rest of their semester discovering literature based on wars throughout world history. They will read *Julius Caesar*, *Animal Farm*, and *Night*.

The journalism kids have been working hard, designing the yearbooks for the high school and for the elementary. You likely have seen them with the cameras at various events this school year. This year's theme is "We were there when it hAPPened," and it is centered around popular apps that kids use. The yearbooks will be on sale in March. The elementary yearbooks will be printed at the service unit and will be selling for \$5 each. The secondary yearbooks are produced by Jostens and will be sold for \$35 each.



The speech team got off to a great start at Pierce, finishing second as a varsity team. Christopher placed 1st in poetry, 2nd in duet, 2nd in humorous, and 3rd in OID. Trinity placed 3rd in persuasive. Tylea finished 2nd in duet and 3rd in OID. Yasmine placed 3rd in OID. Zane finished in 3rd in entertainment. Triniti G. earned 5th in poetry.
