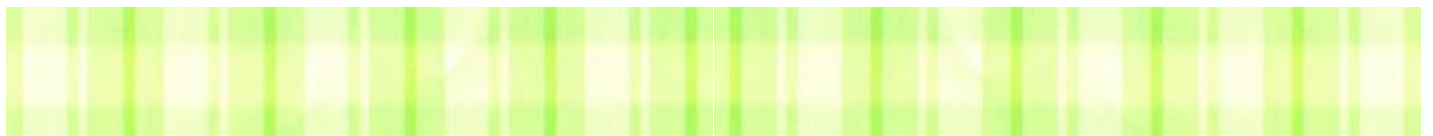
From the Superintendent's desk:

I will be proposing the 2018-2019 school calendar to the school board for their approval, this calendar would also include the preschool calendar. Also at the March board meeting, we will be determining the last day of school for the current 2017-2018 school year so you can make plans for the upcoming summer.

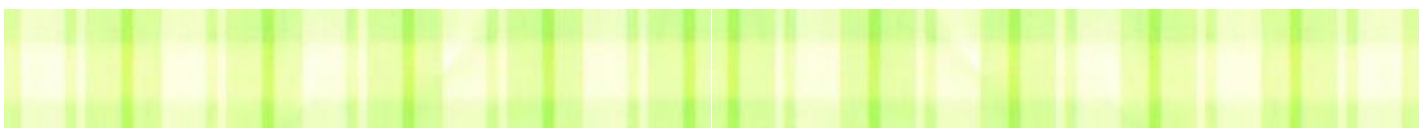


At the beginning of the school year Technology Bootcamp, I referenced that Humphrey Public wanted to bring in an attorney to address social media. We are very happy to share with you that we have contracted Karen Haase, an attorney with the KSB School Law Firm in Lincoln, NE who specializes in educational law to come to Humphrey to discuss social media issues. Together with St. Francis and Lindsay Holy Family, Ms. Haase will be at Humphrey Public School on Tuesday, March 13 to address social media issues with our students in grades 6-8 from 12:30-1:30 and grades 9-12 from 2:15-3:15 respectively. We have also setup a separate time especially for parents from 6:00-7:00 p.m. also at Humphrey Public to address cyber-bullying, online safety, sexting, and other social media concerns. I am really excited to be able to provide our students, staff and parents this opportunity to address what is becoming a serious issue in schools and society. I hope you will give serious consideration to attending this learning opportunity to safeguard your children on social media.

The last item I want to address is the latest violence that has occurred in schools across the United States and Nebraska including the February 14 school shooting that took place in Parkland, Florida. I want to reassure parents of the steps the district has taken to address school security. Schools are meant to be safe havens for students, the events that have taken place across our country are tragic and senseless and shouldn't take place. As administrators at Humphrey Public, we take the responsibility of maintaining safe schools very serious. Several years ago, we decided to lock every door to the school and require all students, parents and visitors to enter through the main door. We have added intruder into the building drills as part of our normal drills and review our emergency action plans annually to see if we can improve safety. We also discuss with our staff the importance of building and maintaining positive relationships with students and assisting them through difficult times. Our staff are in the hallways before school, during passing periods and other times to have conversations with students because the more we interact with kids and talk with them, the more opportunity we have to intervene with any problems students may be having. We are always looking for ways to improve communication, specifically during a crisis so if you have any ideas or things you would like us to consider, please stop by and visit with us because positive parent involvement in our school is very important in maintaining a positive school climate.

As I do with all my newsletters, I want to emphasize to our patrons in the district; should you ever have any questions, please call and get the answers. This will help curb misinformation and eliminate rumors and your concerns. Clear and open communication between the community and the school are vital areas in the success of our school.

It is hard to believe that we are already into the month of March! I hope this letter finds everyone doing well. As

we start the downhill slide to our school year, we will begin our spring testing sessions. Our testing window will open on Monday, March 19th and will run through Friday, April 27th. It is highly important that your student be in school on the testing dates, as it gets a little tricky to get those tests made up.

On Monday, February 5, 2018 we held our second round of parent teacher conferences. In the elementary, we were at 84% attendance and at the junior high and high school level we were around 60%. These numbers are little down from our conferences in the fall. If you were unable to attend, please contact the school and schedule a time to speak with your student's teachers. They would be glad to meet with you and discuss your student's progress.

On Tuesday, March 13, 2018, Karen Haase with KSB School Law will be in the district to present to students, parents, and staff. Karen's presentations will take place in the Humphrey High gym. The parent presentation will start 6:00 p.m. and we highly encourage parents to attend and listen to Karen's message.

It is important that students think about their comments and if they are necessary or not. Your discussions will be valuable in more ways than you think. 
Ms. Oelsigle or myself know. We can help provide support and outside resources that can assist your student and family.

Applications must be returned in person to Mr. Sjuts or Mr. King and are due by 3:30 p.m. on Wednesday, April 4, 2018. Enrollment will be determined by the **2018-2019 Preschool Acceptance Criteria** which is posted on the school's website.

March Health News

Hopefully we have made it through the worst of our sickness, we had many cases of Influenza A and Influenza B, along with strep and bronchitis.

Springs in Nebraska are definitely unpredictable! Spring is the time of year when many things change...temperatures can swing back and forth between balmy and frigid. Sunny days may be followed by a week of stormy weather. Sometimes extreme weather changes can occur even within the same day. With the extreme temperatures in the same day, please make sure your children are dressed appropriately. Jackets worn in the mornings can get forgotten when they go home for the day, so if you notice your child is missing a jacket or sweatshirt, please have them stop by and check the lost and found in the office!

As we want the weather to straighten out, here are some tips I found online to keep in mind as the weather gets better and we can spend more time outside.

SPRING SAFETY TIPS

Ah, spring is finally here! Nice weather, blue skies - what better reason to get outside after long cold months cooped up indoors. Just remember some tips to stay in top health during the spring!

Kids are happy to be outside after the winter, but so are bees/wasps/hornets. If you encounter these insects, stay calm or walk away; do not swat as this angers them. If stung, immediately remove stinger and apply ice to reduce swelling. If stung, and child is allergic, use epinephrine shot or Epi-Pen, and contact doctor immediately.

Running around the yard/parks/the woods means kids might come across poison ivy. So teach them what this plant looks like. ("Leaves of three, leave them be!") Wear long sleeves and pants in areas that might contain poison ivy. If you come in contact with it, apply calamine lotion/hydrocortisone cream; avoid scratching). If a fever develops after exposure, contact your doctor.

Spring frequently brings extra rain, which might make your kids' favorite creek a little faster and deeper than they are used to. Remind them to be extra careful around water, and it's a good idea to check out any water for depth and safety before your kids play around it.

Nice weather means bike weather! If you and/or your children go bike riding, always wear a helmet. Look both ways before crossing the street, and follow crosswalk instructions. Only ride on sidewalks and bike paths that are free of cars.

11th Grade:

1. The statewide ACT Date is approaching. You all have access to your own personalized ACT Prep. I hope that you are all taking advantage of this tool, paired with On To College, formally John Baylor, Test Prep, so that you are able to obtain your best possible score. A good ACT score can have a huge effect on your future. Do what you can to prepare now so there are no regrets in the future!
2. Also, keep looking into colleges and future careers. If you need help setting up college visits or job shadows, please let me know. Both visits and shadows are very important ways in helping to determine future plans.

12th Grade:

1. It is scholarship season! I have sent out any scholarship that I am aware of. Please, take the time to read through them and see if you qualify. If you do qualify, take the time to fill out the scholarship. Remember, it is free money, and when you're in college, that is beyond lovely.
2. Many scholarships require letters of recommendation. When asking for these letters, provide the writer with adequate time to complete a solid recommendation. It also may be necessary to remind them if you have once asked, but remember to ask in a polite and respectful manner.
3. Have someone proof read your scholarship application. Sometimes, the determining factor is grammar. Make sure that you are not one who is not chosen because of this.
4. Be sure to finish the year strong. Although it is rare, if your academics slip drastically due to a lack of effort, colleges have reversed acceptance. On that note of colleges, if you have narrowed down your search, log into your college's portal and make sure all necessary information has been received. There may be financial aid awards to accept/decline, housing documents to complete, or small fees to pay. If you are unsure of what to do, please come in and see me. We can talk about what all of the information means.

As always, please contact me with any concerns you might have. I will do my very best to answer the question myself, or I will do my best to find the answer. Many of you upperclassmen may be nervous and stressed. That is totally normal. Let me know if I can help ease those nerves or stress in any way.

March is here! That means that soon the syncopated sounds of dribbling basketballs and squeaky shoes on gym floors will be replaced by the steady beat of running shoes on the track. The pep band will change from its upbeat, fun tunes and inspirational school song to challenging contest pieces. Instead of hearing the scraping of ice from car windows, we will be hearing the sweet refrains of returning songbirds! Each of these sounds is an example of music, at least if you choose to listen to them in that way. March is Music In Our Schools Month, so I challenge you, and the elementary students, to listen for music in all parts of your life! The theme for the 2018 Music In Our Schools Month celebration is Music Connects Us. I am sure you each have examples of how music has connected you to life events and emotions. My goal is to use music to make connections in many areas to benefit your children!



There are so many benefits to music education. A few that I think you might find interesting are that it increases skills in listening and concentration, enhances spatial awareness and physical coordination, and promotes teamwork and leadership skills. A recent research study at Northwestern University shows a direct link between keeping a steady beat with music and a more consistent ability to read. Music is an enjoyable way to help enhance every other subject taught in any school. I am so excited to give the students at Humphrey Public Schools musical opportunities! Here are some examples of what the elementary students are participating in, learning about, and exploring.

Preschool and Kindergarten students spend most of their time singing together and using body movements to dance to music. They love to play the rhythm instruments and dance with scarves to express themselves. At this age, they work to start and stop together when singing and begin to match pitch by learning the difference between their singing voices and their speaking voices. They each have a letter day that corresponds with the letter they are learning about in their classrooms.

1st graders learn about the importance of loud/soft dynamics, fast/slow tempos, high/low pitches, and long/short sounds. It is so fun to be able to give them song lyrics and watch them read along! Music is a great way to help with reading skills because of the repetition and rhyme! They begin to investigate the instrument families. Keeping a steady beat in the early education years is also an important skill that will help them with future skills.

In addition to singing and dancing, 2nd graders learn about what each note value looks like. They learn about notes and rests and their durations. Quarter, half and whole notes and rests are suspiciously a lot like fractions! 2nd graders also learn how written music is read, knowing what repeat signs look like and various other symbols. They learn that when a note

is at the top of the music staff, their voices should get higher and when a note is at the bottom of the staff they sing lower.

The biggest new thing the 3rd graders learn is to recognize the treble clef note names! “F-A-C-E – FACE – These are the names on the space” – and Every Good Bird Does Fly (treble clef lines) are the mnemonic devices they learn to help them remember the note names. Both of these sayings incorporate things that are “high” as the treble clef are the higher notes that we sing. They also do more practicing with note values and counting rhythms. I also like to start teaching 3rd graders how to read music while playing the Boomwhackers (pitched percussion tubes).

4th graders are combining reading music’s pitches and rhythms while forming the correct fingerings to play the recorders. They are quickly discovering that PRACTICE makes playing much easier and hopefully many will conquer the Black Belt in our recorder curriculum, “Recorder Karate”. Get ready, Mr. Bertrand, because you’ve got some great future 5th grade band members coming your way!

5th and 6th graders are working on singing more difficult 2 part harmonic vocal pieces and remembering all the things they have learned throughout the years. Bass clef note names and intervals are introduced. They spend a lot of time practicing proper posture, breathing and forming the sounds with the shape of their mouths. They even learn a little Italian as many musical terms and phrases are written in this language. Listening and learning to appreciate other types of musical styles and cultures from all over the world are also an important part of their experience in the music room. They even sing in other languages at times! However, the musical language is one that is universal in all areas of the globe. We discuss how music evokes emotions and connects us in ways that are hard to describe in any other method.

As spring emerges from this long winter, I will for sure be listening for every musical joy I can find. I challenge you to make connections with musical sounds as well. I believe that music is a way to open up the minds, hearts, and souls in us all to enhance our abilities to think, create and imagine. I am extremely fortunate to spend my days creating musical masterpieces with the students at HPS and at the Lindsay Attendance Center. The connections I have made during my 20 years of teaching your children go far beyond the musical ones!

Welcome to 5th Grade! It's been a wonderful school year so far! Students are busy working towards finishing their AR Goals for movie this quarter. They also have been focusing on completing their AR goals for our Dr. Seuss Movie Party.

What's new in 5th Grade:

What I Like About You! This is a project the 5th graders have been working on. Each week, two students are chosen to participate in What I Like About You! The student who is chosen, creates a self-portrait while the rest of the class writes one sentence saying what they like about that person. I then put all their likes in a word document and hang the self-portrait in the hallway. The students enjoy reading what their classmates like about them and it promotes positivity throughout our class!



Reading: We will soon begin our poetry unit. Students will be learning about stanzas and the different rhyme schemes found in poetry. Some of the different types of poetry we will look at are: free verse, couplets, acrostic, haikus, and limericks. Students will be given the opportunity to create their own poetry throughout the unit.

Math: The students just finished up their unit on adding, subtracting, multiplying, and dividing fractions. We are now moving on to multiplying and dividing with decimals. The students are finding out how important it is to know their math facts!





Coming Up:
