


FUTURE FARMERS OF AMERICA






ANNUAL STAFF

After the crowning the cake and punch were served. Following the refreshments came the dance. The rayally denced first to the theme song "I'd Love you To Want Me."






































A special congredulations goes to Matt Brandt, he was honored by being named to all Conference and all Conference honorable mention teams both as a back and a lineman,








Our record, six wirs and twelve issue, was very mislessing. Many of our games were lost in the closing minutes of the game which exemphipied our exciting brand of basistball.




































BOWLING

And everyone enjoyed more freedom, as well as beaming. Overall they helped to make school a memorable time for us all.


