


On the morning of January 26, 1978, a terrible car-train accident claimed Mrs. Detletien's life.




### CROSS-COUNTRY





The girl's record of one win and six losses was very misleading. Five of the teams had been entablished before them, and two of the games were fost by less then three points.


The highlight of the season came on January 20th when they trampled Petersburg with a 31-19 victory.
