Psychology, Anatomy, and Art are three of the many interesting classes students from H.H.S. take. Psychology is taught by Mrs. Brunswick. This class is made up of three seniors-Gina Greisen, Becky Brandl, and Leslie Cattau.

In this class students study the behavior of people and animals. This class also includes many activities. Mr.Robb taught American history to the junior class. In this class juniors learned about U.S. history from 1865 to the present date. The class required students to complete current events reports, biographies, periodicals, and to cover materials in the text book. Mr.Robb said,"I would like to have the students believe that history is the relationships, and cause and effects in nature. Not just names and dates."

Who teaches child development/ fashion, food & nutrition/housing & home furnishing, basic life skills, teen living, adult living. You guessed it, it's Mrs. Elaine Bruening.

"My students should develop into self-forming individuals who take action to improve conditions for the family and for society. A self-forming person is a self-actualizing, fully functioning person who makes reasoned judgments, is humanly caring, and through the process of practical reasoning acts responsibly for self and others," replied Mrs. Bruening.

Child development dealt with how to raise a child and how to react to them as they grow.

The class Fashions consisted of designing your own clothing, sewing, and learning about fashions.

In Foods and Nutrition students learned how to cook. The emphasis in this class was not only on how to cook things but also on how to eat right.

Housing and Home Furnishing covered the physiological, psychological, and social aspects of housing, modern trends in housing, evaluation of floor plans and room arrangements in terms of needs and managements, and a study of types of housing.

H.H.S. Sounds Great

What makes the Humphrey High school sound so great is the band and the music classes. Miss Bair teaches the band and Mrs. Goering teaches the music classes.

Miss Bair, the band director, teaches a variety of classes. Some of these are Advanced Band, Intermediate band, Beginner band, and lots of individual lessons. Miss Bair and her band went to the University of Nebraska-Kearney Band contest, played in the Veterans' Day Services, and they also went to the District Music Contest and the Cornhusker Conference Band Clinic. What Miss Bair enjoyed most about teaching was working hard on a piece of music that is challenging for the students and me and getting it learned so we can perform it well at a concert or contest." If you compare this year's band, to years past, "this year's band is younger overall than year's past. There are no seniors and just four juniors. Simply put, Humphrey is a farming community. That's why H.H.S. offered a variety of agricultural education classes last year. Speaking at the front of all of these classes is Doug Rumsey.

Mr. Rumsey has a wide range of expertise in the areas he teaches. Livestock/Crop Production are classes that have an emphasis on management. Farm Management is taken by students who plan on going into farming and need to know the organization part of the job. Entrepreneurship in Agriculture covers marketing, finance, product development, advertising, and business management. Horticulture is taught so students get a full understanding of plants. Natural Resources covers pollution, wildlife management, conservation, forestry, and energy uses. Ag Rotation is a cross between Horticulture and Leadership.
