Students Check Out the World

Social Studies for the students, government and world problems, and people are thought about and seen everyday. Psychology is taught by Mrs. Brunswick. Social Studies includes the history of Nebraska, World Cultures, the government of the country, the geography of the continents and the world. Mr. Glock taught the 7th and 8th graders in junior high social studies. Ms. Kelly taught government, geography, and 8th grade careers. Mr. Ditter taught modern problems to the high school.

Mrs. Brunswick has been teaching psychology for five years. This year she taught two students who also visited Wesleyan University to attend the Psychology Fair. The students learned and studied about the behavior of normal and not-so-normal people and animals. Mr. Troy Glock has been teaching 7th–8th grade social studies. He enjoyed teaching about China and India's world cultures the most. His smallest class had 14 students and his largest were the 8th graders with 17 students. The 8th graders went to the State Capital, Morill Hall, The Bob Devany Sports Center, and the Football Stadium with the 4th graders. This trip is done every year between the two classes. Mr. Glock loved the educational trip because the students saw some Nebraska athletes and he enjoyed the students, as they were well behaved on the trip.

Ms. Kelly is one busy counselor, but her interests are in history and government. She loved to watch the tenth graders discover new things about places around them and around the world. There was a great concentration placed on learning where countries are, what their climate and vegetation was like, and what other people's economic lives were like. The geography class had a truck driver who sent them letters telling where he had traveled and the students plotted the places on the map.

"I think having the knowledge about our government is very important to the future taxpayers. Three Classes are Relaxed

Mrs. Brock has been teaching Spanish at Humphrey Saint Francis for ten years. Also in these ten years she has been having the privilege of saying "Hola" to the students of HHS. There were 12 Humphrey High individuals learning Spanish I and II. She also had a Spanish III class. The Spanish II students were able to go on a trip this year to Spain. Last year they visited Mexico. The Spanish students corresponded in Spanish with other Spanish students at Lakeview High in Columbus. This gave the students the opportunity to put their learned Spanish to use. Mrs. Brock did not make Spanish a boring subject, but a learning opportunity by singing, dancing, eating Mexican foods like popcorn, making commercials, writing books, and playing games with Spanish words.

This class dissected eyes, brains, and sometimes hearts and fetal pigs. Humphrey High school established Special Education in the 1930's, but they supplied teachers in 1964. Title 1 Reading was offered for students ages preschool-12 and has been available at Humphrey High School since 1976. This year the school supplied four teachers for these aresas: Mrs. Reding, who was a speech language specialist; Mrs. Ditter, who taught title one reading; Mrs. Wilson, who taught special education at the convent; and Mrs. Widhalm who taught special education at Humphrey Public.

"When students understand the concepts and they get excited about learning more, I, too, am excited to help them excel even more, and am glad to help them," Mrs. Wilson commented. Her rules in class were that the students must have homework completed on time and quietness must be given when they are in class. Also, showing and practicing good manners, promptness, and kindness should be thought about at all times.

When the students learn and then say, "Oh, I see!" Mrs. Ditter was very pleased and loved her job even more. She has been teaching Title 1 Reading at HHS for 35 years. She helped students from grades 1-6 explore the technology of the world with computers, and with the new and old words they have learned. To make it fun for the students, she would use crossword puzzles, magic tricks, and invitation days. She also helped her students with their reading. She asked every student to respect everyone and everything.

Mrs. Reding has been teaching students from preschool to seniors for 22 years now. She enjoyed seeing the students understand a difficult concept and having them learn and improve their social and academic skills. Her most important rule was "Do not interrupt another person" and "Do not put anyone down in any way." She taught students in small groups and gave each child his own individual attention. She felt great after hearing that students want to join her in her class.

"My greatest moment will be this year when Carolyn Brandl walks across the stage at graduation. I have been working with her ever since her accident in kindergarten, twelve years ago. It will be a part of me leaving this year," Mrs. Widhalm remarked after teaching K-12 grade special education in Humphrey for 16 years. She helped children with learning disabilities, mild handicaps, traumatic brain injuries and hearing problems. "My students are the best part of my job." She feels great if she got most of her students for most of their school life. After the students see her year after year, they feel comfortable around her and that helped with school work, family life and just talking. It also felt good to know that both Mrs. Widhalm and the students feel comfortable when accidentally the student says "Mom" instead of Mrs. Widhalm.
