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

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











Determination is Key to Power

The 1996-97 Football team had much to prove this year. They had to prove that they cared and that no matter what happened they would not give up. They had to be determined throughout the season to show their coaches, family, classmates and themselves that no matter what the circumstance, they had to be ready to play with enthusiasm and spirit.

This year the boys' head football coach was Barry Tasa and their assistant coach was David Emanuel. The team was made up of seven seniors, six juniors, seven sophomores and six freshmen. Their captains were Aaron Korth and Blake Hellbusch.

This year the players who received awards for their determination and efforts were as follows: Jason Gronenthal, All-Conference Honorable Mention quarterback; Marvin Gronenthal, All-Conference Honorable Mention runningback and linebacker; Chad Pfeifer, All-Conference Honorable Mention runningback; Blake Hellbusch, All-Conference Honorable Mention tight end; Aaron Korth, All-Conference Honorable Mention center and defensive line and Todd Groteluschen, All-Conference Honorable Mention offensive line and defensive line.

The top rusher for the Bulldogs this year was Sean Chaulk with 456 yards, and Chad Pfeifer rushed for 306 yards. Jason Gronenthal completed 94 passes for a total of 524 yards. Sean Chaulk also lead in tackles with 53. Blake Hellbusch received 21 passes and rushed for 313 yards.


Attitude Makes a World of Difference




Lady Bulldogs Put Together Great Season

The 1996-97 girls' basketball team started out very hot as they won their first six games. Their final record was 14-5, but all loses came when their opponents out scored them by ten points or less. The Lady Bulldogs won the Benedict Holiday Tournament and got second place for their hard work in the regular season Cornhusker Conference with a regular season record of 6-1 with the only loss coming to the Howells Bobcats. The Lady Bulldogs were in first place going into the Conference Tournament; they ended up receiving fourth place. They were also the top seed going into Sub-Districts, but after all their hard work and determination, they couldn't pull off a triple overtime effort over their neighbors from the north, the Humphrey St. Francis Lady Flyers.

This year the goals of the team were to make it to state, win the conference tournament, be number one in the conference during the regular season and win the Benedict Holiday Tournament. The head coach this season was Dave Irwin, in his 28th year coaching, and the assistant coach was David Emanuel, in his first year of coaching. The captains for this years team were Amy Greisen, Tina Groteluschen and Lisa Sliva, all seniors.

Everyone thought the year went very well overall. At times there were arguments and about five disappointing moments, but when they got out on the court everyone tried their best and forgot the word "I" and focused on the word "team".

At the end of the season, many of the players received awards for their own goals and efforts. Tara Sjuts received All-Conference 1st team, <u>Omaha World Herald</u> 2nd team All-State, and <u>Norfolk Daily News</u> Honorable Mention. 
It's All In The Attitude

The freshmen-sophomore team also participated in the Stanton Tournament in which they lost their first game to Norfolk Catholic and the second one to Wakefield.







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

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

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







It's always a great honor to be one of the top students in your class or to be part of an important organization. National Honor Society and Student Council include these honors.



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

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




The Future is now the Present




