I can't believe that we are already in March. As I sat down to write my letter, it felt like I had just written my February newsletter. I don't know about you, but I am loving the longer days. I want to start off by thanking all of our parents for attending parent teacher conferences at the beginning of February. It's important to have a chance to check in with your child's teacher to make sure they are making progress as the year progresses. If you attended, we were asking parents to complete a short survey for school improvement purposes. We are scheduled to have our External Visit next Spring and part of the process is to collect stakeholder feedback. You may have seen this shared out on our social media as well as our website. If you have not had a chance to complete the survey, I would encourage you to complete one. We would greatly appreciate it. I want to congratulate our winter sports teams on outstanding seasons. The girls and boys bowling teams qualified for the Class B State Tournament. We also had four individuals qualify for the singles portion of the state tournament. Those qualifying were Colter Schneider, Noah Stone, Ashley Pfeifer, and Morgan Hake. Ashley finished in the top five of the girls tournament. The boys and girls basketball teams made it to the district final games, falling one game short of the state tournament. Our Speech team is getting ready to compete at districts, which Humphrey Public is hosting on Monday, March 6th. That is a NO SCHOOL day for students and I would encourage you to come and support our speech team if it works in your schedule.

An update on our facility project process. We will be interviewing and selecting a Construction Management firm to oversee the project. 9th-10th Grades:

11th Grade:

- 1. The statewide ACT Date is approaching. We will test on March 21st. We are currently completing the On to College curriculum, which was formally known as John Baylor Test Prep. I hope all are taking it seriously and soaking in as much information as possible. A good ACT score can have a huge effect on your future. Do what you can to prepare now so there are no regrets in the future!
- 2. Also, keep looking into colleges and future careers. If you need help setting up college visits or job shadows, please let me know. Both visits and shadows are very important ways in helping to determine future plans.

12th Grade:

- 1. It is scholarship season! I have sent out any scholarship that I am aware of. Please, take the time to read through them and see if you qualify. If you do qualify, take the time to fill out the scholarship. Remember, it is free money, and when you're in college, that is extremely helpful.
- 2. Many scholarships require letters of recommendation. When asking for these letters, provide the writer with adequate time to complete a solid recommendation. It also may be necessary to remind them if you have once asked, but remember to ask in a polite and respectful manner.
- 3. Have someone proof read your scholarship application. Sometimes, the determining factor is grammar. Make sure that you are not one who is not chosen because of this.
- 4. Be sure to finish the year strong. Although it is rare, if your academics slip drastically due to a lack of effort, colleges have reversed acceptance. On that note of colleges, if you have narrowed down your search, log into your college's portal and make sure all necessary information has been received. There may be financial aid awards to accept/decline, housing documents to complete, or small fees to pay. If you are unsure of what to do, please come in and see me. We can talk about what all of the information means.

As always, please contact me with any concerns you might have. I will do my very best to answer the question myself, or I will do my best to find the answer. Many of you upperclassmen may be nervous and stressed. That is totally normal. Let me know if I can help ease those nerves or stress in any way.


Music IS all of us. In most cultures, music is added to any event to amplify its impact. We don't go a day without hearing some form of music in some way, shape or form. It is often our fun, our relaxation, our motivation or our sense of release. March is set aside to celebrate music education! Without music education in our schools, I wonder if we would have the same musical experiences if children were never taught to listen, read, play, create, or move to it. The composers, musicians, singers, dancers, instrumentalists, and lyricists that supply us with the background music of our days and our own personal soundtracks had to be taught by someone!

Research shows that musical activities stimulate development in <u>every</u> area of the brain including vision, hearing, speech, balance, sensation, behavior, skill, movement and emotion. It helps to prepare students for individual success in reaching their goals, but also provides opportunities to work with others to create a shared goal.

The Brain's Benefits

Some of the brain benefits from childhood music education include:

- Improved auditory skills can help your child focus in class and at home
- Increased spatial intelligence makes it easier to learn math, science, and reasoning skills
- Auditory differentiation can **improve language learning**, both now and later in life
- Improved motor skills can make your child more dexterous and graceful
- Increased memory can lead to better grades
- Slight IQ advantage for college students
- Better language processing abilities in senior adults



The elementary students at HPS are receiving all of these benefits without really realizing it! I hope to help them appreciate all types of music as they listen, move, read and perform it themselves! Here are just some of the elements of music that are areas of focus for them. The following chart shows a snapshot of what they learn during music class. The next time you listen to music while driving, watching sports, a movie or even a commercial, think about the people behind that music learning these things as children!
