From the Superintendent's desk:

I was looking back at last year's April newsletter and thought that March of 2021 was a pretty awesome month for our school, staff and students and all the awesome achievements accomplished by the Bulldogs. Fast forward a year and as most of you know, we exceeded last year's achievements and then some. Let's start with our HLHF girls bowling team. In my March newsletter, I celebrated the achievements by our girls bowling team who won the runner-up trophy at the NSAA State Bowling Championships in Lincoln.

This year due to the Big 10 wrestling championships being held in Lincoln March 1-5, the NSAA moved the girls state basketball tournament to the same week as the boy's state basketball tournament. This meant the HLHF Bulldog girls and boys basketball tournament would be played the same week. The HLHF boys basketball team and coaches started off the tournament on Monday, March 7 beating Howells-Dodge in overtime in the first round, then beat Norfolk Catholic in the semi-finals and won the state championship game over Grand Island Central Catholic at Pinnacle Bank Arena Friday afternoon in overtime to claim the Class C-2 Boys State Championship trophy. This championship was the second championship in a row and three in the past four years for the boys basketball team. The girls basketball team and coaches followed suit and began tournament play on Tuesday, March 8 beating Nebraska Christian in the first round, then beat Archbishop Bergan in the semi-finals and then claimed the girls first state basketball championship in school history beating Shelton on Saturday morning at Pinnacle Bank Arena. What an awesome week of basketball for our coaches, players, managers, students, schools and parents/fans. Very few players/teams in Nebraska ever experience winning a state championship, this year both our girls and boys teams won state championships on back-to-back days!!!

Six days later on Friday, March 18, our Speech team and coaches traveled to Kearney to participate in the Class D-1 state speech meet. The speech students and coaches were coming off a district championship and were ready to defend their state championship from a year ago. The students competed at the highest level and won the Runner-up trophy in Class D-1! Four state trophies, two runner-up and two state champion trophies in a month and half is an incredible ACHIEVEMENT by our coaches and students. Never in the history of our school has this type of success been achieved. I can't tell you how proud I am of all of you because this level of success is a direct result of outstanding support and leadership by our coaches, along with hard work, dedication and determination by our students. I also want you to know that four banners have been ordered and will hopefully be hung in the gymnasium before graduation!!



As we enter the final two months of school, I want share several reminders. Included in the April newsletter is the 2022-2023 school calendar. We will also post the calendar on our school website for your review. I also want to remind parents that we are still accepting preschool applications. If you have a 3 or 4-year old child that meets the age requirements listed on the application, you are welcome to sign them up for our preschool program. If you missed our Kindergarten roundup on March 31 in Humphrey or April 1 in Lindsay, please contact the school office so we can schedule a time to meet with you and get you the appropriate information to complete. For the remainder of this school year, we will do our best to keep you updated via our student announcements with any changes related to school information, and communications.

This newsletter will end as the others have for the past 19 years, should you ever have any questions, please call and get the answers. This will curb misinformation, eliminate rumors, and get your concerns answered. Clear and open communication between the community and the school are vital areas in the success of our school.

I would suggest a Google Doc or Education Quest's Activities Resume. If you are interested in the Activities Resume option, please create an account at www.educationquest.com. After you have created the account, you will find a box titled "Activities Resume." You may then enter any school activities, community activities, and awards that you may have been involved in or received. As long as you always remember your password, or save it somewhere, you will have access to this resume.

3. I challenge all of you to be leaders for underclassmen. This means to set good examples by being involved, helping others, and working hard. The school atmosphere depends largely upon all of you. It is what you make it, so make it great!

11th Grade:

1. It has reached April. You just recently took the ACT. I know you all tried your best, and I am so hopeful your scores make you happy. Please, know you are not defined by this score, though. It's just one test.
2. In case you are interested in taking the ACT again over the summer, you will all still have access to your On To College accounts where you can take a refresher course on John Baylor's grammar tips right before testing.
3. How important is the ACT? It can mean the difference in attending college for free or needing to go into debt to afford college. It can mean the difference in being accepted to certain colleges or not. It can mean having to take remedial courses in college or being able to take the courses right away that are needed for your degree. Many colleges have started to accept super scores, which is the average of all the highest scores in each sub test. Therefore, if you don't have the score you want after one test, please don't give up. Try again!
4. As always, please continue to research future careers and colleges. Campus visits are huge in helping to determine a good fit for you. Please, let me know if you would like me to set up a visit or if you would like to do so on your own. Job Shadows are good opportunities to look at future careers as well. If you need help with this, please let me know.

12th Grade:

1. You are almost finished, but not yet. Please, continue to work hard, show up to class, and maintain good grades. Colleges can still deny you if there are many slips in your academic performance.
2. Many of you have been involved over the years, and I believe it will pay off. One of employers' biggest complaints is that students are not coming prepared with time management skills, which ultimately leads to individuals not showing up for work on time.
